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The European Medicines Agency,

Having regard to the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union,

Having regard to Regulation (EC) No 1901/2006 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 12 December 2006 on medicinal products for paediatric use and amending Regulation (EEC) No. 1768/92, Directive 2001/20/EC, Directive 2001/83/EC and Regulation (EC) No 726/2004¹,

Having regard to Regulation (EC) No 726/2004 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 31 March 2004 laying down Community procedures for the authorisation and supervision of medicinal products for human and veterinary use and establishing a European Medicines Agency²,

Having regard to the application submitted by Bristol-Myers Squibb International Corporation on 6 October 2011 under Article 16(1) of Regulation (EC) No 1901/2006 also requesting a deferral under Article 20 of said Regulation and a waiver under Article 13 of said Regulation,

Having regard to the opinion of the Paediatric Committee of the European Medicines Agency, issued on 6 July 2012, in accordance with Article 18 of Regulation (EC) No 1901/2006, and Article 21 of said Regulation and Article 13 of said Regulation,

Having regard to Article 25 of Regulation (EC) No 1901/2006,

Whereas:

Has adopted this decision:

Article 1

A paediatric investigation plan for peginterferon lambda-1a, solution for injection , subcutaneous use, the details of which are set out in the opinion of the Paediatric Committee of the European Medicines Agency annexed hereto, together with its appendices, is hereby agreed.

Article 2

A deferral for peginterferon lambda-1a, solution for injection , subcutaneous use, the details of which are set out in the opinion of the Paediatric Committee of the European Medicines Agency annexed hereto, together with its appendices, is hereby granted.

Article 3

A waiver for peginterferon lambda-1a, solution for injection, subcutaneous use, the details of which are set out in the opinion of the Paediatric Committee of the European Medicines Agency annexed hereto, together with its appendices, is hereby granted.

Opinion of the Paediatric Committee on the agreement of a Paediatric Investigation Plan and a deferral and a waiver

Scope of the application

Basis for opinion

Pursuant to Article 16(1) of Regulation (EC) No 1901/2006 as amended, Bristol-Myers Squibb International Corporation submitted for agreement to the European Medicines Agency on 6 October 2011 an application for a paediatric investigation plan for the above mentioned medicinal product and a deferral under Article 20 of said Regulation and a waiver under Article 13 of said Regulation.

The procedure started on 16 November 2011.

Supplementary information was provided by the applicant on 19 April 2012. The applicant proposed modifications to the paediatric investigation plan.

Opinion

1. The Paediatric Committee, having assessed the proposed paediatric investigation plan in accordance with Article 17 of Regulation (EC) No 1901/2006 as amended, recommends as set out in the appended summary report:

- to agree the paediatric investigation plan in accordance with Article 18 of said Regulation,
- to grant a deferral in accordance with Article 21 of said Regulation,
- to grant a waiver for one or more subsets of the paediatric population in accordance with Article 13 of said Regulation and concluded in accordance with Article 11(1)(c) of said Regulation, on the grounds that the specific medicinal product does not represent a significant therapeutic benefit over existing treatments for paediatric patients.

The Norwegian Paediatric Committee member agrees with the above-mentioned recommendation of the Paediatric Committee.

2. The measures and timelines of the agreed paediatric investigation plan and the subset(s) of the paediatric population and condition(s) covered by the waiver are set out in the Annex I.

This opinion is forwarded to the applicant and the Executive Director of the European Medicines Agency, together with its annex(es) and appendix.

Annex I

The subset(s) of the paediatric population and condition(s) covered by the waiver and the measures and timelines of the agreed Paediatric Investigation Plan

1. Waiver

1.1. Condition: Treatment of Chronic Hepatitis C

The waiver applies to:

- Infants and children less than 3 years of age;
- for solution for injection, subcutaneous use;
- on the grounds that clinical studies cannot be expected to be of significant therapeutic benefit to or fulfil a therapeutic need of the paediatric population.

2. Paediatric Investigation Plan

2.1. Condition: Treatment of chronic hepatitis C

2.1.1. Indication(s) targeted by the PIP

Peginterferon lambda-1a (lambda), in combination with daclatasvir (DCV) and ribavirin (RBV), is indicated for the treatment of children and adolescents from 3 years to less than 18 years of age with chronic hepatitis C without liver decompensation, who are treatment naïve (all genotypes) or relapsers to prior interferon/ribavirin therapy (GT-1 or GT-4).

2.1.2. Subset(s) of the paediatric population concerned by the paediatric development

From 3 to less than 18 years of age.

2.1.3. Pharmaceutical form(s)

Solution for injection, subcutaneous use

Study 2: Open-label, single-arm, safety and efficacy study of peginterferon lambda-1a/ribavirin in combination with daclatasvir compared to peginterferon alfa/ribavirin in combination with daclatasvir in paediatric patients with CHC.
