Having regard to the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union,

Having regard to Regulation (EC) No 1901/2006 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 12 December 2006 on medicinal products for paediatric use and amending Regulation (EEC) No. 1768/92, Directive 2001/20/EC, Directive 2001/83/EC and Regulation (EC) No 726/2004¹,

Having regard to Regulation (EC) No 726/2004 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 31 March 2004 laying down Union procedures for the authorisation and supervision of medicinal products for human use and establishing a European Medicines Agency²,

Having regard to the European Medicines Agency's decision P/0486/2020 issued on 22 December 2020 and the decision P/0554/2021 issued on 31 December 2021,

Having regard to the application submitted by Merck Sharp & Dohme (Europe), Inc. on 4 August 2023 under Article 22 of Regulation (EC) No 1901/2006 proposing changes to the agreed paediatric investigation plan with a waiver,

Having regard to the opinion of the Paediatric Committee of the European Medicines Agency, issued on 10 November 2023, in accordance with Article 22 of Regulation (EC) No 1901/2006 and Article 21 of said Regulation,

Article 1

Changes to the agreed paediatric investigation plan for fully human IgG1 RB-1 YTE anti-RSV F monoclonal antibody (MK-1654), solution for injection, intramuscular use, are hereby accepted in the scope set out in the opinion of the Paediatric Committee of the European Medicines Agency annexed hereto, together with its appendices.

Basis for opinion

Pursuant to Article 22 of Regulation (EC) No 1901/2006 as amended, Merck Sharp & Dohme (Europe), Inc. submitted to the European Medicines Agency on 4 August 2023 an application for modification of the agreed paediatric investigation plan with a waiver as set out in the European Medicines Agency's decision P/0486/2020 issued on 22 December 2020 and the decision P/0554/2021 issued on 31 December 2021.

The application for modification proposed changes to the agreed paediatric investigation plan and proposed a deferral.

The procedure started on 11 September 2023.

Scope of the modification

Some measures and timelines of the Paediatric Investigation Plan have been modified

Opinion

1. The Paediatric Committee, having assessed the application in accordance with Article 22 of Regulation (EC) No 1901/2006 as amended, recommends as set out in the appended summary report:
 - to agree to changes to the paediatric investigation plan in the scope set out in the Annex I of this opinion;
 - to grant a deferral, the details of which are set out in the Annex I of this opinion.

The Paediatric Committee member of Norway agrees with the above-mentioned recommendation of the Paediatric Committee.

2. The measures and timelines of the paediatric investigation plan and the subset(s) of the paediatric population and condition(s) covered by the waiver are set out in the Annex I.

This opinion is forwarded to the applicant and the Executive Director of the European Medicines Agency, together with its annexes and appendix.

1. Waiver

1.1. Condition:

Prevention of lower respiratory tract infection caused by respiratory syncytial virus (RSV)

The waiver applies to:

- the paediatric population from 2 years to less than 18 years of age;
- solution for injection, intramuscular use;
- on the grounds that the specific medicinal product does not represent a significant therapeutic benefit over existing treatments.
